ROLL CALL

AUTHORITY BUSINESS

1. Regular Meeting Minutes of July 28, 2023.

The summary minutes of the July 28, 2023, meeting were provided to the Board for review.

Motion 19-23 to approve the regular meeting minutes of July 28, 2023, was made by Director Farrington by Director Gonzales carried by voice vote: Yea 5 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

2. Forest Projects Plan - Phase 1 Implementation Project

This FPP - Phase 1 fuels reduction implementation project, funded by a \$4,999,967 Cal Fire grant will treat 2,295 acres in the Eldorado National Forest and is the first in a series of projects included in the FPP - Phase 1 Plan. The project area lies entirely within the Eldorado National Forest, Amador Ranger District, and parallels Highway 88. The treatment work area to be performed by the contractor includes 2,262 acres of mastication and 33 acres of hand thinning. The recommended contract allows for additional treatment acres based on yet-to-be determined budget availability.

Authority staff administered a request for proposal for the FPP - Phase 1 work and prospective bidders were each sent RFPs and the RFP was posted on UMRWA's website. Eight proposals were received for the project and were reviewed and rated by the Authority Selection Committee (comprised of UMRWA and USFS staff). The Board was presented a table that summarized the proposals received. BurnBot, Inc. (BurnBot) was determined by the committee to be the best-qualified proposer and staff is recommending the Board approve a general services agreement with BurnBot.

The Selection Committee rated BurnBot highly in Approach and Technical Criteria, Experience, and References. Their proposal demonstrated an understanding of the requirements, scope, and project specifications, with provisions that exceed safety and fire precaution requirements. BurnBot plans to deploy eight masticators and support equipment with a work schedule indicating project completion by mid-August 2024. According to its references, BurnBot performs quality work, often completes work ahead of schedule, and is considered an outstanding contractor and very cooperative to work with. BurnBot's proposal is within the UMRWA budget and equal to UMRWA's cost estimate. BurnBot is not a local service provider and is headquartered in South San Francisco. In summary, the Committee recommends awarding the FPP - Phase 1 general services agreement to BurnBot, Inc. based on affordability and work service delivery.

Motion 20-23 to approve and authorize the Executive Officer to sign the General Services Agreement with BurnBot in the amount of \$3,672,000 was made by Director Davidson seconded by Director Farrington and carried by voice vote: Yea 5 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

3. FPP - Phase 1 Implementation Funding Strategy Follow-up

At the July 28 meeting the Board was presented a Funding Strategy designed to allow UMRWA to implement fuel reduction projects to treat the 26,000+ acres addressed in the Forest Projects Plan - Phase 1. Two supporting presentations were also made to the Board that day, each addressing a specific funding element. David Lach, Director of Environmental Products at Anew, provided an overview of the Avoided Wildfire Emissions carbon credit market and Matt Sjoholm and Nick Wobbrock, of Blue Forest Conservation, presented an update on progress being made towards a Forest Resilience Bond in support of UMRWA's forest work. Following the Board's Funding Strategy discussion, staff was asked to schedule follow-up conversations with staff from other agencies that have experience with the key Funding Strategy elements – the Anew carbon credit market program, and Blue Forest's Forest Resilience Bond.

The Board hosted an on-line conversation with staff from Tahoe National Forest, Yuba Water Agency and the National Forest Foundation who shared their experiences working with Blue Forest Conservation and the success of their Forest Resilience Bond. The group discussed the utilization of the program, current lines of credit, project treatment areas, cash flow pace in scale with grant funding and the partnerships, beneficiaries and stakeholders invested. The Board asked questions regarding the bidding process, securing loans and interest rates.

The Board then asked the EO about other credit funding options. The EO shared the possibility of a line of credit from EBMUD and explained that some grants allow upfront funding to be spent within six months but include additional administrative costs. Staff plans to present the Board with line of credit agreements for their review at the January meeting.

Board Member Comments:

Director Farrington thanked the Executive Officer for the informative discussion on the Forest Resilience Bond.

Executive Officer Comments:

The EO informed the Board that the 3^{rd} amended JPA has been finalized and uploaded to UMRWA webpage.

<u>ADJOURNMENT</u>: Director Woodrow adjourned the meeting at 11:19 a.m. The next regular meeting will be held on October 6, 2023, at Pardee Lodge.

Title:

FPP - Phase 1 Implementation Report

Summary:

This Forest Projects Report - Phase 1 Implementation Report presents an update on the Forest Resilience Bond (FRB), FPP - Phase 1 implementation efforts and concludes with a table titled 'UMRWA Forest Project Grants' which summarizes grants awarded and grant applications planned or pending.

Forest Resilience Bond:

UMRWA's implementation of Phase 1 will require an annual cash flow potentially approaching \$10M. With grant payments in some cases taking up to 90 days or longer, it will be necessary for UMRWA to arrange bridge financing or a line of credit (LOC) to ensure UMRWA has sufficient cash in hand to timely pay treatment contractors (typically 30 days from request for payment). In September UMRWA staff met with EBMUD's Finance Director (UMRWA's Controller) to ensure a LOC is in place when needed. The cost of borrowing from an EBMUD LOC have previously used the rates based on the Local Agency Investment Fund which are currently around 3 percent. The cost of the EBMUD LOC at this rate would be approximately \$75,000 per year assuming a 4,000 acre-per year implementation rate. As a potential alternative, UMRWA staff have been working on a Forest Resilience Bond (FRB) with Blue Forest Conservation, which would provide a zero interest LOC and may also be used to obtain and dedicate new funding from non-UMRWA beneficiaries of UMRWA's forest health work, for example PG&E and other corporates (both currently in contracting discussions).

The financial instrument for the FRB is an unsecured Loan and Services Agreement between the LLC created for this FRB and UMRWA. A preliminary draft of such an agreement is included in the supplemental documents for this agenda. Key terms of the FRB include:

- Unsecured revolving line of credit up to a maximum amount
- Zero percent interest rate
- Invoicing the FRB for work completed
- Payment from the FRB to UMRWA, allowing UMRWA to timely pay contractors
- Repayment from UMRWA to the FRB only once grant reimbursements are received
- Description of the services which must be completed (generally the work specified in UMRWA grant agreements)
- Reporting on work completed, aligned with existing grant reporting requirements

The execution of an agreement between the FRB LLC and UMRWA is subject to Blue Forest's evaluation of UMRWA's credit worthiness. That process started in August and is nearly concluded. Blue Forest has signaled they expect a favorable conclusion. A finalized draft agreement will be included for board consideration at the January 2024 meeting.

FPP - Phase 1 Implementation Update:

The Board awarded a contract to BurnBot, Inc. at the August 25 Special Meeting. A Notice to Proceed was issued to BurnBot on September 19 and they have started work.

In September, CalFire and UMRWA executed a second grant agreement for Phase 1 implementation. Contractor procurement for implementation work under that grant will be conducted in 2024. The second CalFire grant agreement includes \$506,000 to continue Phase 2 planning work.

UMRWA Forest Project Grants:

UMRWA has two active CalFire grants, two active SNC grants, and one active Wildlife Conservation Board grant. Applications for two SNC Wildfire Recovery and Resilience grants were submitted in late September, and staff are working with SNC's Regional Forest and Fire Capacity Program on a potential grant to further fund Phase planning. These grants are summarized below.

Title:

FPP - Phase 2 Planning Report

Recommended Actions:

Authorize the Executive Officer to execute Amendment 2 to the agreement with Stantec for Phase 2 planning to increase the authorized agreement cost ceiling by \$400,000 from \$175,000 to \$575,000.

Forest Projects Plan - Phase 2 Planning:

The landscape-level Phase 2 FPP initiative began in September 2022. The planning and associated environmental processes will address forest health issues on up to 225,000 acres of Stanislaus and Eldorado NF lands within and flanking the Upper Mokelumne watershed. This second phase of the FPP process will consider forestry activities not included in Phase 1 due to potentially more significant environmental impacts. For comparison, FPP - Phase 2 is expected to be similar in scope and complexity to the Stanislaus NF's SERAL Project. Phase 2 planning is underway and the USFS/UMRWA team is meeting regularly. The Technical Advisory Group and stakeholder meetings have started and data collection and consolidation is in progress. A draft Purpose and Need statement has been completed and a modeling approach and consultant selection process is nearly concluded. The team is poised to perform landscape assessments and begin to develop project alternatives in early 2024.

In August 2022, UMRWA executed its original contract with Stantec (at that time Cardno, Inc.) with the intention of using this firm for Phase 2 project management and environmental documentation as funding became available. The initial agreement was funded for \$50,000. Amendment 1 was executed in January 2023 for an additional \$125,000 funded by UMRWA (\$50,000) and SNC's RFFCP (\$75,000). Amendment 2 would add \$400,000 to the agreement using funding from the recently executed CalFire grant. This will allow the project to proceed into 2024 and accomplish key milestones including completing the Notice of Intent, selecting and contracting with a modeling consultant and initiating landscape assessments, continuing Technical Advisory Group and stakeholder meetings, and other tasks identified in the Stantec scope of work. Staff is pursuing several paths to obtain the additional funds needed to complete Phase 2 planning, estimated to be in the range of \$1.5 million.

Title:

Biomass Management JPA Presentation

Summary:

Christiana Darlington, CLERE Inc. will present an update to the Board regarding the California Forest Residual Aggregation for Market Enhancement (Cal FRAME) Pilot Study to consider the development of joint powers authorities (JPAs) to increase the utilization of biomass and improve the economics of forest health work in the Sierra Nevada.

With excessive amounts of dead trees, brush and small diameter wood that need to be removed from California's forests, existing and proposed wood waste utilization (e.g., biomass) projects face a major challenge when it comes to demonstrating sufficient and long-term access to woody feedstock sources. Volatile markets, declining USFS budgets and staffing capacity, low value of biomass vs. high transportation costs, and contract administration are among the most significant of these challenges. In response to these challenges, the Cal FRAME model, has emerged. Ms. Darlington will discuss the Cal FRAME program and the possibility of creating a JPA in the south-central Sierra between UMRWA, Tuolumne County and the Mariposa County Resource Conservation District. This initial presentation will discuss the need and potential benefits, the types of activities such a JPA might engage in, and next steps and timeline for developing and evaluating such a proposal.

Title:

Legislative Issues Update

Recommended Action:

For discussion and possible action.

Summary:

AB 338 would make specified forest health work subject to California prevailing wage law, potentially resulting in a substantial increase in the cost of this type of work. The bill only applies to work that has an apprentice program in the building and construction trades and would likely apply to equipment operators and laborers on forest health implementation projects. This bill is authored by Assembly member Aguilar-Curry. The UMRWA board voted to oppose this bill at its April 28 meeting and an opposition letter was sent to the author on May 8, 2023. On September 20, 2023, the bill was enrolled and sent to the governor for signature. If enacted the bill would become law on January 1, 2025, with a one-year delay for non-profits.

AB 998 would require the State Energy Resources Conservation Commission, on or before January 1, 2025, to issue a report on utility-scale biomass combustion facilities to assess options to maximize the environmental benefits of these facilities. The report would include a recommended strategy to upgrade facilities where appropriate and consider impacts on disadvantaged, rural, forested and agricultural communities, impacts on capacity for managing forest biomass, cost, job creation, and energy creation. The bill if enacted might help to improve the economics of forest health work by providing a revenue stream for biomass generated. The bill is currently in committee.

There are several bond bills that would provide forest health and infrastructure funding which would benefit UMRWA and its member agencies. None of these bills appear to have made progress since the July UMRWA board meeting. All remain in committee with hearings postponed and no action in the past two months.

AB 1567, as amended on May 26, 2023, would enact the Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparation, Flood Protection, Extreme Heat Mitigation, Clean Energy and Workforce Development Bond Act of 2024, which, if approved by the voters, would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$15.995B to finance these projects. The bill would also allocation \$5.25B for projects to address drinking water supply and infrastructure needs.

SB 638, as amended on June 28, 2023, would enact the Climate Resiliency and Flood Protection Bond Act of 2024 would authorize \$6B in bonds mostly for flood control measures in the Central Valley with \$1B of this amount earmarked to help local agencies fund dam repairs and improvements.

SB 867 as amended on June 22, 2023, would enact the Drought and Water Resilience, Wildfire and Forest Resilience, Coastal Resilience, Extreme Heat Mitigation, Biodiversity and Nature-Based Climate Solutions, Climate Smart Agriculture, and Park Creation and Outdoor Access Bond Act of 2023, which, if approved by the voters, would authorize the issuance of \$15.5B in bonds to finance these projects. The bill would allocate \$5.2B for water resilience projects and \$3B for forest resilience projects and would go to the voters for approval at the March 5, 2024, state primary election. The bill would only be effective if SB 638 is enacted prior to January 1, 2024.
