#### **Summary Minutes**

#### **ROLL CALL**

Directors John Coleman, Terry Woodrow, Richard Farrington, Brian Oneto, Jeff Davidson, Jack Garamendi, Donna Leatherman, and Ed Gonzalez were present. Also present were Executive Officer Rob Alcott, Authority Counsel Gregory Gillott, Authority Secretary Lisa Stuart, and 15 visitors and presenters.

<u>PUBLIC COMMENT</u> – Joe Bors gave a brief update to the Board regarding the Amador Tuolumne Community Action Agency's (ATCAA) recently funded residential water conservation program.

#### **AUTHORITY BUSINESS**

#### 1. Regular Meeting Minutes of January 27, 2017

**Motion 05-17** to approve the minutes of the regular January 27, 2017 Governing Board meeting was made by Director Davidson, seconded by Director Farrington, and carried by voice vote: Yea 8 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

#### 2. CSRC&D Youth Watershed Stewardship Program

UMRWA has provided funding to support the local public schools Youth Watershed Stewardship Program (YWSP) since fiscal year 2006. When the Board approved the FY2017 agreement with CSRC&D this past October to implement this program for another year the Board questioned whether a forest management component was included in the program's teachings. Maryanne Garamendi, invited to discuss the YWSP curriculum with the Board, presented information about the Stewardship Through Education (STE) teacher organization, an outline of some of its curriculum, and heard the Board's interests in seeing the program specifically include forest management and healthy forest components in the curriculum. Directors Farrington and Oneto offered to meet and provide additional insights regarding the Board's interests and potential sources for related resource information.

#### 3. UMRWA Procurement Policy and Procedure

On October 6, 2016, the Board directed staff to formulate an UMRWA procurement policy and procedure. A draft Procurement Policy and Procedure was reviewed at the January 27 Board meeting following which the Board requested staff to present a final Procurement Policy and Procedure for approval at the April 28 meeting. The UMRWA JPA agreement specifies the Authority will exercise powers "as are imposed upon a municipal utility district in the exercise of its powers." Thus, the proposed UMRWA Procurement Policy and Procedure developed with the assistance and advice of EBMUD purchasing staff is generally consistent with related policies and procedures applicable to municipal utility districts in California, including EBMUD.

The proposed Procurement Policy and Procedure includes changes discussed at the January 27 Board meeting and several new additions summarized here:

- 1. Added section defining three types/levels of procurement.
- 2. Added provisions for procuring Materials and Supplies, and Sole Source purchases.
- 3. Delineated five categories of criteria that will generally be applied when evaluating proposals.
- 4. Added section that identifies prohibited actions.

The Procurement Policy and Procedure will guide procurements associated with the Pumpkin Hollow Restoration work and future Authority procurements. The EO recommended that the Board approve the UMRWA Procurement Policy and Procedure.

**Motion 06-17** to approve the UMRWA Procurement Policy and Procedure as presented was made by Director Davidson, seconded by Director Farrington, and carried by voice vote: Yea 8 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

#### 4. Pumpkin Hollow Restoration Project

Over the past twelve months UMRWA has systematically completed a series of requisite tasks that has positioned the Authority to initiate the Pumpkin Hollow restoration work plan, which requires the solicitation of proposals from qualified contractors to complete the Pumpkin Hollow Restoration Project.

The Pumpkin Hollow work plan anticipates project tasks will be completed over a two-year period. In 2017 the work is organized into four units, one to be completed by the California Conservation Corps (CCC) and three to be completed by contractors selected following a Requests for Proposals (RFPs) process.

The EO recommended that the Board authorize the release of Requests for Proposals for the general services work described and authorized in the Pumpkin Hollow Restoration Project SPA (Specific Project Agreement) and the Sierra Nevada Conservancy Prop 1 grant agreement.

**Motion 07-17** to authorize the release of Requests for Proposals for the general services work described and authorized in the Pumpkin Hollow Restoration Project SPA (Specific Project Agreement) and the Sierra Nevada Conservancy Prop 1 grant agreement was made by Director Davidson, seconded by Director Gonzalez, and carried by voice vote: Yea 8 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

#### 5. Legislative Issues Update and SNC Legislative Tour

Directors Oneto and Director Farrington discussed timber and water conservation bills, respectively. Richard Sykes provided brief updates on proposed legislation dealing with environmental water flows, expansion of Wild & Scenic criteria, and conservation.

As requested by the Board, the EO has been in communication with SNC staff regarding the planned legislative tour that will focus on the rural – urban connection and relevant resource management actions in the Sierras. Following a March 14 discussion with the UMRWA Board Advisory Committee, UMRWA staff proposed to SNC that UMRWA would consider co-supporting the legislative tour equally sharing the costs with SNC up to a maximum \$2,000 UMRWA share. The current year UMRWA budget can accommodate this unanticipated expense.

The SNC has solicited UMRWA's tour suggestions and the following topics were submitted for SNC's consideration: Butte Fire sites (wildland-urban interface); Blue Lakes

Subdivision (powder beetle impacts); CHIPS (Calaveras Healthy Impact Product Solutions); new grant-funded West Point WTP and transmission facilities; and lunch stop briefing by the Amador Calaveras Consensus Group (ACCG).

Per the Board's prior request, SNC agreed the tour would not be held until after the May ACWA conference. Presently, the dates of July 26 and 27 are being considered.

**Motion 08-17** to authorize payment of up to \$2,000 toward the costs of the Sierra Nevada Conservancy 2017 Sierra Legislative Tour that will focus on Upper Mokelumne region issues was made by Director Oneto, seconded by Director Leatherman, and carried by voice vote: Yea 8 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

#### 6. Update on Prop 84 Implementation Grants

The EO presented the status of Calaveras County's efforts to fulfill the terms of its Round 2 Implementation Grant for the Ponderosa Way Project. He also gave brief updates on fulfillment of the two ongoing UMRWA Proposition 84 Implementation Grants awarded by the Department of Water Resources; the 2014 Drought Grant and the Round 2 Implementation Grant.

**Motion 09-17** to authorize the Executive Officer to sign an amendment to the Round 2 grant agreement to modify the grant budget to reallocate \$74,490 in surplus unspent Ponderosa Way Restoration Project funds to the Camanche Area Regional Water Supply Project was made by Director Farrington, seconded by Director Leatherman, and carried by voice vote: Yea 8 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

#### 7. Draft Proposed Fiscal Year 2018 UMRWA Budget

The EO presented the Board with a draft FY 2018 budget, in which the member-funded portion of the proposed budget is \$154,500 less than the prior year (\$147,000 versus \$301,500). He also presented an estimate of the Member Agency funding allocations, including estimates of in-kind services provided this fiscal year and estimates of the resulting Member Agency funding allocations and the associated assessment amounts.

For the non-member funded portions of the budget, the funding associated with Prop 84, Sierra Nevada Conservancy and USFS sources for FY 2018 will be determined in September, the final month of UMRWA's fiscal year. Awarded but uncollected funds will be carried forward to FY 2018. Those amounts will be determined based on the end of fiscal year Treasurer's Report as of September 30, 2017. As is the case each fiscal year no Member Agency funding is budgeted to support these non-Member funded activities in FY 2018.

The EO recommended that the Board endorse the draft FY 2018 UMRWA budget and authorize staff to transmit the draft budget to Member Agencies for review and comment.

**Motion 10-17** to endorse the draft FY 2018 UMRWA budget and authorize staff to transmit the draft budget to Member Agencies for review and comment was made by Director Oneto, seconded by Director Leatherman, and carried by voice vote: Yea 8 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

#### 8. Basic Financial Statements for the Year Ending September 30, 2016

The EO recommended the Board accept for filing the Basic Financial Statements for the Years Ending September 30, 2016 and September 30, 2015. East Bay Municipal Utility District, whose Finance Director serves as the Authority's Treasurer, maintains the Authority's financial records. The Authority's financial records for the year ending September 30, 2016 have been audited by the independent accounting firm Maze and Associates. This year's audit is presented in the document entitled Upper Mokelumne River Watershed Authority Basic Financial Statements for the Years Ending September 30, 2016 and September 30, 2015. In addition to the Basic Financial Statements, Maze and Associates has prepared a companion document titled Memorandum on Internal Controls and Required Communications. These documents present a general overview of the Authority's finances, demonstrate the Authority's accountability of the monies it manages, and provide general information related to the preparation of the audit for the Authority's Governing Board and management. The audit reports neither find nor describe any financial problems or irregularities.

**Motion 11-17** to accept financial statement for filing was made by Director Davidson, seconded by Director Farrington, and carried by voice vote: Yea 8 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

#### 9. Treasurer's Report - Second Quarter FY 2017

The Treasurer's Report for the second quarter of Fiscal Year 2017, which ended March 31, 2017, was presented to the Board.

**Motion 12-17** to accept the Treasurer's Report for filing was made by Director Farrington, seconded by Director Davidson, and carried by voice vote: Yea 8 – Nay 0 – Abstain 0.

#### 10. Executive Officer Grant Funded Quarterly Report

Pumpkin Hollow Restoration Project

#### Summary:

As provided under the Pumpkin Hollow Supplemental Project Agreement and the Sierra Nevada Conservancy Prop 1 grant agreement, UMRWA will undertake forest improvement work within the Pumpkin Hollow project area within the Stanislaus National Forest. The work, organized into four units, will be contracted out to three contractors and the Greater Valley Conservation Corp. A request-for-proposals process was administered by the Authority for the work to be performed by the contractors. Seven proposals were submitted and reviewed by the Authority Selection Committee. Agreements with the three best-qualified providers are recommended for approval, as is the agreement with the GVCC. Also recommended today is authorization for the Executive Office to execute a modification to the Pumpkin Hollow Restoration Project Supplemental Project Agreement (SPA). While the SPA contains sufficient total funding to perform the recommended work minor modifications are appropriate to conform the SPA budget to actual project costs.

#### Discussion:

By June 5th RFPs were issued to eighteen firms for three separate Stanislaus National Forest work projects. The three RFP scopes of work and related project specifications, and the potential proposers list were prepared jointly with USFS staff. A pre-proposal meeting to address questions by potential proposers was held at the Calaveras Ranger District office on June 27. Seven proposals were received by the July 5 deadline. The Authority

selection committee, including a USFS representative, met on July 7 to perform a comprehensive review of the proposals based on the criteria described in the RFPs. The three proposers deemed by the committee to be the best-qualified contractors are recommended for hire. The tables below show the three work projects and the associated proposers, their business locations, and their submitted costs. The recommended contractors are noted with an asterisk.

A field inspection of the 9.25 miles of USFS roads to be maintained under the Road Maintenance and Roadside Fuel Break (RFP 17-02) project revealed that the heavy winter weather has further damaged the roads and related drainage elements. UMRWA and the USFS have worked to revise the work plans and specifications to account for this additional required work. The revised plans are being reviewed with the recommended contractor, J&R Logging, and a revised mutually agreeable cost for the expanded scope of work will be reported at the Board meeting.

#### Supplemental Project Agreement Modification:

A total of \$614,665 is presently budgeted in the Supplemental Project Agreement for Pumpkin Hollow work. These USFS dollars, in combination with UMRWA's Sierra Nevada Conservancy's Prop 1 Healthy Watersheds grant, are the funding sources that UMRWA will rely to pay the costs associated with these recommended work agreements. As the final project costs are determined, it is anticipated the SPA will need to be updated to reflect these final costs. [The Board may recall when approving the initial SPA in July 2016 we expected a series of SPA editions over time in order to reflect agreed upon changes that respond to changed forest conditions within the project area or other new information.] The anticipated SPA changes will be presented at the Board meeting.

Title:

Update on AB 142 Wild & Scenic Study

Recommended Actions:

#### Summary:

Mr. Joey Wall, Policy Advisor at the California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA) is scheduled to attend this Board meeting. Mr. Wall is CNRA's lead staff person for administering the Mokelumne River Wild and Scenic study called for by AB 142 (Bigelow). This study will yield a report analyzing the suitability or nonsuitability of designated segments of the Mokelumne River as additions to the State's Wild and Scenic River System. The Upper Mokelumne River Watershed Authority, as specified in AB 142, has entered into a cost-sharing agreement with CNRA for the report.

CNRA has contracted GEI, Inc. to prepare the report, with Mr. Phil Dunn as the Principal Investigator. CNRA circulated a Request for Information to solicit materials that may be relevant for the report's findings; this information or a notification of intent to send relevant information was requested by July 21, 2017. After review of existing information, GEI will conduct a suitability assessment in accordance with requirements of AB 142 for CNRA and conduct outreach to stakeholders and the public around the final report.

CNRA has expressed its appreciation for UMRWA's supporting role in this initiative to implement AB 142.

#### Title:

Fiscal Year 2018 UMRWA Budget

#### Recommended Action:

Approve the FY 2018 UMRWA budget.

#### Summary:

Following UMRWA's established budget procedure, the Board at the April 28 meeting reviewed the proposed FY 2018 Budget and directed staff to transmit the proposed budget to Member Agencies for review and comment. A memorandum presenting the proposed FY 2018 budget and Member Agency assessment amounts was sent to Member Agency General Managers and County Administrative Officers (with copies to each Member agency's UMRWA Board director) on May 10. Responses were received from AWA, JVID and EBMUD expressing general support for the proposed budget; no objections were received.

The FY 2018 Budget, as detailed below, is presented today for the Board's approval.

#### Discussion:

The FY 2018 budget is presented in Table 1. The member-funded portion of the proposed budget is \$154,500 less than the prior year (\$147,000 versus \$301,500). Presented in Table 2 are estimated Member Agency funding allocations, including allowances for inkind services provided this fiscal year by Amador County and EBMUD. Resulting Member Agency funding allocations and associated assessment amounts are shown in Table 3.

The budget is organized to distinguish between the Authority's two primary revenue sources, Member funding and non-Member funding (formerly referred to as grant funding, but now also including USFS receipts). Accordingly, the Authority's work activities planned for FY 2018 are similarly organized as shown below.

#### **For the Member-funded portion** of the FY 2018 budget:

- 1) Maintain (unchanged) the Authority Board and Authority administration budget (including data and website technical support) for a total \$70,500.
- 2) Maintain (unchanged) the annual funding support for the local school watershed education program at \$16,500.
- 3) Reduce to \$50,000 (from \$100,000) the funding level for consultant and staff costs associated with developing new grant applications and developing funded project elements.
- 4) Include \$10,000 for start-up of a Mokelumne Community Forest program.

5) Remove the UMRWA \$125,000 half-share toward the costs for the AB 142 Wild and Scenic study.

Overall, the proposed Member funded portion of the proposed FY 2018 budget is \$154,500 less than the FY 2017 budget amount.

**For the non-Member funded portions of the budget**, the funding associated with Prop 84 implementation grants, the Sierra Nevada Conservancy Prop 1 grant and USFS sources for FY 2018 will be determined in September, the final month of UMRWA's fiscal year. Awarded but uncollected funds will be carried forward from FY 2017 to FY 2018. Those amounts will be determined based on the end of fiscal year Treasurer's Report (as of September 30, 2017). No Member Agency funding is budgeted to support these non-Member funded activities in FY 2018.

#### Title:

CSRC&D Youth Watershed Stewardship Program FY2018 Agreement

#### Recommended Action:

Approve the agreement with the CSRC&D for fiscal year 2018 and authorize the Executive Officer to execute the agreement.

#### Summary:

Each year beginning in 2006 UMRWA has provided funds to support the local public schools Youth Watershed Stewardship Program (YWSP). The program is facilitated under an agreement between UMRWA and the Central Sierra Resource Conservation and Development District (CSRC&D), which in partnership with Stewards Through Education (STE) sponsors the YWSP.

Following the Board's recent discussions regarding the YWSP's curriculum Directors Farrington and Oneto meet with CSRC&D Chair Valerie Klinefelter and STE representative Maryanne Garamendi to review potential curriculum enhancements that address forest fire and forest health concepts. An agreement with the CSRC&D to conduct the YWSP for another year is attached to this agenda item (the FY2018 UMRWA budget includes \$16,500 to continue the Authority's support of this program). The Scope of Work includes the task; Integrate lessons on "Healthy Forests Resist Wildfires" to include impacts of catastrophic wildfire on water quality and other resources and methods to restore and sustain healthy forests to resist fire. The recommended agreement between UMRWA and CSRC&D for the FY 2018 program is attached.

#### UMRWA and Sustainable Healthy Forests:

With the devastating Rim, King, and Sand wildfires in the last five years north and south of the Mokelumne Watershed, and then the recent Butte Fire, it has become abundantly clear that Sierran headwater forests and resources face extreme risk from wildfire. Catastrophic wildfire in the Mokelumne Watershed could severely damage water quality that water agencies highly depend on, and could adversely impact other resources including soils, fish, wildlife, air quality, carbon capture, and recreation resources. Since UMRWA's responsibilities include "enhancement of (i) watershed environmental values, (ii) water quality protection, and (iii) recreation activities (2008 JPA 2nd Amendment)," it is appropriate for UMRWA to advocate educational programs that focus on forest fire and forest health concepts.

Increasing public health, safety and welfare risks associated with catastrophic wildfires are driving a multitude of Federal and State agencies, water agencies, policy researchers,

and local groups such as the Amador-Calaveras Consensus Group to action. The Public Policy Institute of California has written:

"The health of California's headwaters is at risk. Historic forest and fire management practices have made forests overly dense and prone to extreme and costly wildfires. Large fires raise numerous challenges for water management—they can reduce water quality and reservoir storage capacity, while increasing risks of flooding and landslides. Headwaters are also under stress from a changing climate. The hot, dry conditions of the latest drought led to record tree mortality and wildfires—a glimpse of what the future might hold."

In 2015 the California Natural Resources Agency and US Forest Service signed an agreement to work together on a Sierra Nevada Watershed Improvement Program (WIP). The agreement identifies:

"The pace and scale of science-based ecological restoration needs to dramatically increase in order to stem the tide of large, uncharacteristic wildfires and further degradation of these ecosystems. This restoration includes the thinning and management of forests through manual, mechanical, and prescribed fire treatments."

The Sierra Nevada Conservancy has written:

"Wildfires in the Sierra Nevada are getting bigger and more intense. Forests and meadows are stressed, compromising the Region's ability to filter and store water for use later in the year. Greenhouse gases are being released at a higher rate than previously expected due to drought and insect-related tree mortality, and high intensity fire events."

In 2016, UMRWA entered into a Master Stewardship Agreement with the US Forest Service committing to partnering on fire reducing forest health and watershed improvement in the Mokelumne River watershed including the Hemlock and Pumpkin Hollow projects.

It is within this context that it is proposed the Youth Watershed Stewardship Program curriculum include topics that focus on forest health, fire risk and damage, and watershed improvement. The types of questions and related topics that illustrate UMRWA's perspective on potential curriculum content include the following.

#### What are impacts from catastrophic wildfire in headwater forests?

- Degrades water quality What & How?
- Increases water temperature How?
- Damages soil and increases erosion How?
- Increases sedimentation How?
- Degrades fish and aquatic wildlife and habitat How?
- Degrades birds and terrestrial and other wildlife How?
- Damages endangered and sensitive species How?
- Reduces reservoir capacity How?
- Increases air pollution How?
- Reduces carbon sequestration How?
- Reduces recreational opportunity How?
- Increases water runoff and reduces retention How?

#### What can be done to reduce wildfire impacts and protect the watershed?

- Prevent overcrowding and dying of trees and vegetation Why?
- Reduce spread rate of fire -How?
- Promote healthy forests and soils How?
- Increase water retention How?
- Increase water yield How?
- Decrease water temperature Why & how?
- Maintain access by roads and trails Why & how?

As presented and discussed with CSRC&D and STE representatives on June 14, outlined below are sources of topical information that could serve as resources for developing curriculum enhancements that address UMRWA's concerns and interests related to healthy forests.

#### AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTING SERVICES

THIS AGREEMENT FOR CONSULTING SERVICES (Agreement) is entered into as of October 1, 2017 by and between Central Sierra Resource Conservation and Development, Inc. (CSRC&D), 501c3 a nonprofit public benefit corporation, and Upper Mokelumne River Watershed Authority (Authority), a joint powers agency formed pursuant to the laws of the State of California.

#### RECITALS

- A. CSRC&D and UMRWA have a common objective to develop and promote a cost effective Youth Watershed Stewardship Program (YWSP) that builds on local working relationships for the conservation and wise use of water in the areas served by UMRWA members.
- B. CSRC&D and UMRWA have determined it to be in their mutual interests to establish a contractual relationship whereby collaborative watershed education efforts between teachers, students, community partners and UMRWA members may be established through the YWSP.
- C. Authority desires to engage CSRC&D, and CSRC&D desires to be engaged by Authority, to provide consulting services to perform certain tasks necessary to develop and implement the YWSP, in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Agreement.
- D. Authority is not financing the Agreement but is relying on contributions from its Members to fund the activities set forth herein.

NOW THEREFOR, in consideration of the performance of the covenants herein contained, the parties agree as follows:

#### 1. SERVICES TO BE RENDERED BY THE CSRC&D

CSRC&D will introduce the tasks as specified in the Scope of Work & Budget (Exhibit A, attached and incorporated by this reference) for the following Amador and Calaveras County schools, and perform Exhibit A tasks in those schools where an invitation is received, provided that CSRC&D will provide services in at least three fourths of schools listed below:

CSRC&D will also target after school youth programs to encourage additional youth participation in the YWSP.

CSRC&D agrees to commence performance forthwith and to complete the Scope of Work in conformance with Exhibit A.

2. CHANGES IN SCOPE OF SERVICES. Both the Authority's Board of Directors and CSRC&D Governing

Council (Council) must approve any extension of time, change order, change in the Scope of Work, change in the contract price, or other term or condition affecting CSRC&D's duties set forth herein. Any change to the terms and conditions of this Agreement not authorized in writing by the UMRWA Board of Directors and CSRC&D Council shall be null and void.

3. TERM OF AGREEMENT; TERMINATION. This Agreement shall terminate automatically on successful completion of the Work, or on October 31, 2018. Either party may terminate this Agreement with or without cause on thirty- (30) days written notice. In the case of such early termination, CSRC&D shall be paid for all services rendered in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Agreement up to the effective date of termination, up to the maximum fee prescribed for any task.

#### 4. REPORTING AND COMPENSATION.

- 4.1 CSRC&D shall submit invoices indicating activities performed and expenses incurred during the preceding invoice period. Invoices shall be submitted no more frequently than monthly and no less frequently than quarterly. All invoices shall be accompanied by a report containing the information referenced in section 4.3 below. No retention shall be required. Payment for all undisputed charges shall be made by the Authority within 30 days of receipt of the invoice. Disputed charges, along with supporting documentation that demonstrates the reasonableness of the dispute, must be communicated to CSRC&D within 30 days of receipt of the invoice.
- 4.2 Invoices (in PDF form) shall be submitted via email to Rob Alcott at <a href="robalcott@aol.com">robalcott@aol.com</a>. Compensation to CSRC&D shall be paid in accordance with UMRWA's share of the compensation for each task included in the Scope of Work as set forth in Exhibit A. In no event shall UMRWA's share of compensation for completion of the Scope of Work exceed the maximum amount of \$16,500. Authority's payment of compensation is dependent upon Authority's receipt of funds for this Agreement from its Members.
- 4.3 Each invoice submitted pursuant to this Section 4 shall be accompanied by a report containing the following information: (i) percentage of completion of each task listed in Exhibit A; (ii) schools, students, and teachers participating in the Program; (iii) field trips undertaken, (iv) material produced pursuant to this Agreement, and (v) any other activities funded through this Agreement.

#### 5. SUPERVISION OF THE SCOPE OF WORK.

- 5.1 CSRC&D shall be responsible for ensuring that the Scope of Work is properly performed. Authority shall deal only through the Council, who shall be responsible for the proper execution of the entire Scope of Work.
- 5.2 CSRC&D shall be responsible to Authority for the acts and omissions of its employees, subcontractors, and their agents and employees, and any other persons performing any of the Scope of Work under a contract with CSRC&D.
- 6. <u>ASSIGNMENTS</u>. CSRC&D may not assign, subcontract, or transfer its interest in this Agreement without the written consent of Authority.
- 7. CSRC&D NOT EMPLOYEE OF AUTHORITY. It is understood that CSRC&D is not acting hereunder as an employee of Authority but solely as an independent contractor. CSRC&D, by virtue of this Agreement, has no authority to bind or incur any obligation on behalf of Authority. It is understood by both CSRC&D and Authority that this Agreement shall not under any circumstances be construed or considered to create an employer-employee relationship or a joint venture.
- 8. <u>NOTICES</u>. All notices herein provided to be given, or which may be given, by either party to the other, shall be deemed to have been fully given when made in writing and deposited in the United States Postal Services, certified with return receipt requested, with postage prepaid and addressed as follows:

The address to which notice shall or may be mailed, as aforesaid, to either party shall or may be changed by written notice given by such party or the other, as hereinbefore provided, but nothing herein contained shall preclude the giving of any such notice by personal service.

#### 9. INDEMNIFICATION AND INSURANCE.

- 9.1 CSRC&D shall indemnify, defend (upon request of the Authority) and hold harmless the Authority and its agents, board members, elected and appointed officials and officers, employees, volunteers and authorized representatives from any and all losses, liabilities, charges, damages, claims, liens, causes of action, awards, judgments, costs, and expenses (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorney's fees of counsel, expert fees, costs and staff time, and investigation costs) of whatever kind or nature (collectively "Claims"), that arise out of or are in any way connected with any negligent error, act or omission of CSRC&D and/or its officers, agents, employees, independent contractors, subcontractors, or authorized representatives, unless such Claim arises out of the sole negligence or willful misconduct of the Authority or its agents or employees.
- 9.2 CSRC&D shall take out and maintain at all times during the term of this Agreement, a policy or policies of insurance as follows:
  - (a) General Liability Commercial General Liability Insurance of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage, including but not limited to endorsements for the following coverage: Premises, personal injury, and products liability.
  - (b) <u>Automobile Liability</u> Automobile Liability Insurance of not less than One Million Dollars (\$1,000,000) combined single limit per occurrence for bodily injury and property damage is required in the event motor vehicles are used by CSRC&D in the performance of the work.
  - 9.3 CSRC&D shall furnish a certificate of insurance and policy endorsements satisfactory to the Authority as evidence that the insurance required above is being maintained. CSRC&D agrees that the insurance required above shall be in effect at all times during the term of this Agreement. In the event said insurance coverage expires at any time or times during the term of this Agreement, CSRC&D agrees to provide at least 30 days prior to said expiration date, a new certificate of insurance evidencing insurance coverage as provided for herein for not less than the remainder of the term of this Agreement, or for a period of not less than one year.
  - 9.4 Certificates of insurance must provide that the insurer will not cancel the insurance coverage without 30 days prior written notice to the Authority; and shall state that the Authority, its officers, officials, employees, and

volunteers are included as additional insured, but only insofar as the operations under this Agreement are concerned. This provision shall apply to all liability policies *except* workers' compensation insurance policies.

- 9.5 CSRC&D shall be responsible for payment of any deductible contained in any insurance policy required under this Agreement and CSRC&D shall also be responsible for payment of any self-insured retention. Any deductible or self-insured retention must be declared to, and approved by the Authority prior to beginning the Work. In the event any deductible and/or self-insured retention is deemed unacceptable by the Authority, either (i) CSRC&D's insurer shall reduce or eliminate such deductible or self-insured retention as respects the Authority, its officers, officials, employees, representatives or agents; or (ii) CSRC&D shall provide a financial guarantee, satisfactory to Authority, guaranteeing payment of losses and related investigations, claim administration, and defense expenses.
- 9.6 CSRC&D's insurance coverage shall be primary insurance as respects the Authority, its officers, officials, employees, and volunteers. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by the Authority, its officers, officials, employees or volunteers shall be in excess of the CSRC&Ds insurance and shall not contribute with it.
- 9.7 In accordance with the provisions of Article 5, Chapter 1, Part 7, Division 2 (commencing with Section 1860), and Chapter 4, Part 1, Division 4 (commencing with Section 3700), of the Labor Code of the State of California, Consultant is required to secure the payment of compensation to its employees and shall for that purpose obtain and keep in effect adequate Workers' Compensation Insurance. CSRC&D is aware of the provisions of Section 3700 of the Labor Code, which requires every employer to be insured against liability for workers' compensation or to permissibly self-insure in accordance with the provisions before commencing the performance of the services of this Agreement.
- 10. <u>CONTRACT EXECUTION</u>. Each individual executing this Agreement on behalf of the Authority and CSRC&D represents that he or she is fully authorized to execute and deliver this Agreement.

Title:

Update on Prop 84 Implementation Grants

#### Recommended Action:

Ratify the Executive Officer's signature on Drought Grant agreement Amendment 2 which reallocates budgeted grant dollars to substitute water conservation projects.

#### Summary:

This agenda item presents brief updates on fulfillment of the two ongoing UMRWA Proposition 84 Implementation Grants awarded by the Department of Water Resources; the 2014 Drought Grant and the Round 2 Implementation Grant.

#### 2014 Drought Grant:

The Drought Grant agreement with DWR was executed on April 23, 2015. The original term of this agreement expired January 15, 2017. At the October 2016 meeting the Board authorized the EO to execute an amendment to the 2014 Drought Grant agreement to extend the term to April 15, 2018. That amendment was executed on February 15, 2017.

As previously reported to the Board beginning in July 2016 one of AWA's two grant-funded drought projects was determined to be unfeasible and an effort to identify eligible substitute projects was then initiated. In May 2017, following months of extended coordination between AWA, UMRWA and DWR, an acceptable reallocation of grant funds was determined. To expedite AWA's planning and engineering work needed to implement the substitute conservation projects the EO executed Amendment 2 on May 11.

With Amendment 2 the Drought Grant funding has been reallocated to fund two new substitute water conservation projects, and to fund Ione WTP Backwash Project costs that exceed the original Drought Grant funding allocation. The current status of the Amador Water Agency projects receiving re-allocated grant funding under the amended agreement is provided in Table 1 below.

#### Title:

UMRWA Policies Including Conflict of Interest Code

#### Recommend Action:

- 1. Authorize the Executive Officer to file the Biennial Notice with the Fair Political Practices Commission indicating no amendment to the UMRWA Conflict-of-Interest Code is required.
- 2. Approve the recommended revisions to the Investment and Financial Management Policy and Procedure

#### Discussion:

Since the Authority was created in the year 2000 the Board of Directors has adopted a Conflict of Interest Code and three policies and procedures. As the Authority continues to adapt and tackle new opportunities it is anticipated additional policies and procedures will be needed. In anticipation of this organizational evolution the previously adopted code and three policies have been numbered (or re-numbered) and organized under the uniquely creative title of 'UMRWA Policies and Procedures' shown in the table below.

As discussed below, two of the above require review and Board action today.

#### Conflict of Interest Code:

The California Political Reform Act requires every multi-county agency to review its conflict-of-interest code biennially and submit a Biennial Notice to the Fair Political Practices Commission (FPPC) that indicates whether the agency's code is accurate or

whether it needs to be amended. If amendments are needed, the revised conflict-of-interest code must be submitted to the FPPC for approval within 90 days of filing the Biennial Notice.

Review of UMRWA's conflict-of-interest code indicates that no amendments are warranted. Accordingly, the Authority should file its Biennial Notice with the FPCC indicating no amendments are required.

Note: The Conflict of Interest Code is also now being incorporated into UMRWA's Policy and Procedures (as Policy 1).

#### Investment and Financial Management Policy and Procedure:

In July 2008, in response to the Authority Treasurer's recommendation, the Board adopted the UMRWA Investment Policy. Through recent communications with the Treasurer's office it was determined an update to that policy is appropriate. The attached policy and procedure reflects the recommended changes, including expanding the policy to include broader financial management considerations. These will be reviewed with the Board at the Board meeting.

#### **CONFLICT of INTEREST CODE**

Policy No. 1

Adopted: 22 April 2004

The Political Reform Act (Government Code Section 8100, et seq.) requires state and local government agencies to adopt and promulgate conflict of interest codes. The Fair Political Practices Commission has adopted a regulation (2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730) that contains the terms of a standard conflict of interest code that may be incorporated by reference in an agency's code. After public notice and hearing it may be amended by the Fair Political Practices Commission to conform to amendments in the Political Reform Act. Therefore, the terms of 2 California Code of Regulations Section 18730 and any amendments to it duly adopted by the Fair Political Practices commission are hereby incorporated by reference. This regulation and the attached Appendix designating officials and employees, and establishing disclosure categories, shall constitute the conflict of interest code of the Upper Mokelumne River Watershed Authority.

Designated employees shall file their statements with the Secretary of the Upper Mokelumne River Watershed Authority who will make the statements available for public inspection and reproduction. (Gov. Code Section 81008). Upon receipt of the statements of the Members and Alternate Members of the Board of Directors and the Executive Officer, the Authority shall make and retain a copy and forward the originals to the fair Political Practices Commission. Statements of other designated employees are to be retained by the Authority.

# INVESTMENT and FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT POLICY and PROCEDURE (Draft)

### Policy No. 2

Revised: 28 July 2017 Adopted: 25 July 2008

Pursuant to the Joint Exercise of Powers Agreement establishing the Upper Mokelumne River Watershed Authority, the Treasurer of East Bay Municipal Utility District serves as the Treasurer of the Authority, and the Director of Finance for East Bay Municipal Utility District serves as the Controller of the Authority.

IT IS THE POLICY OF THE UPPER MOKELUMNE RIVER WATERSHED AUTHORITY TO:

- Generally adhere to the Investment Policy of East Bay Municipal Utility District.
- Rely on the professional guidance and financial expertise of the East Bay Municipal Utility District Treasurer and Finance Director in fulfilling the Authority's treasury, controller, accounting and audit functions.
- Place the authority and responsibility with the Executive Officer, or designee, to administer and coordinate the Authority's day-to-day financial affairs with the East Bay Municipal Utility District Treasurer and Finance Director, or their designees.

### PROCEDURE:

The Authority's surplus funds are held in the East Bay Municipal Utility District's treasury and are to be invested consistent with the District's Investment Policy 4.07 as updated from time to time (the District's Policy). The Authority recognizes the District's Policy is compliant with, but may be more restrictive than, the California Government Code, which allows the Authority to invest its surplus funds.

The Authority may request the District Treasurer to invest Authority funds in a specific investment and the District Treasurer will make a reasonable effort to fulfill the request.

The Authority acknowledges the District invests, consistent with District Policy 4.07, some or all Authority funds in funds providing daily liquidity, such as the State of California's Local Agency Investment Fund.
